There is just one more term of Kavanagh College before we start 2023 as Trinity Catholic College. Kavanagh College has been home to many, many learners since 1989 when it began. Geography Trips

Year 12 - Aoraki Mt Cook

On 27 July, the Year 12 Geography students and two teachers hopped on a bus headed for Aoraki Mt Cook. Poor weather caused road closures leading us to detour through the scenic and snowy Lindis Pass.

After five hours on the bus we arrived at the Hooker Valley Track. Although running out of daylight, we still walked to the first lookout to stretch our legs after the drive. It became apparent that everyone had lots of energy to be released as snowballs started flying left and right including the odd one from the teachers.

The next morning we met Janine, a DOC ranger, who talked to us about the processes of glaciation and human impact on the South Island High Country. It turns out the room we were in would have been 600m under a glacier hundreds of years ago. Janine then took us on the Governors Bush Walk trail to collect data for our internal assessment and we noted down plant types, altitude, temperature, and so on to suit our own research topics. The track had no shortage of snow and bush, as well as views of the stunning surrounding mountains.





That night we watched a 3D movie about Aoraki Mt Cook at the Hermitage Hotel and at times it felt like you were the mountaineer climbing the peaks. The following morning we woke to clear skies and news that we were going to be able to fly in the helicopters. This sped up the rate of packing up camp significantly as everyone was eager to hit the air. Flying in the helicopter was an amazing experience - you could see everything from braided rivers to white mountain tops. Our pilot landed us on a hilltop where we were able to get out and explore - the snow was deep with a crisp top and the views were incredible. Flying in the helicopter was a definite highlight for every geography trip goer and a great way to wrap up an awesome few days.

Science Fair

Two students from Kavanagh entered projects in the 2022 Aurora Energy Otago Science and Technology Fair and both succeeded in winning prizes.

Saira Eldho (Year 9) investigated if it would be possible to produce biogas from cow manure, vegetable peel, and mashed banana and whether temperature would affect the rate of gas produced. She won the Aurora Award for Excellence in Energy Research.



Sarah Al-Balushi (Year 13) investigated the effect of predicted climate change on half crabs and possible links to other similar crustaceans. Sarah won four awards - the University of Otago Department of Zoology Award, the University of Otago Department of Biochemistry Award, the Australian and New Zealand Council for the Care of Animals in Research and Teaching Award, and an Aurora Award.



O'Mathalon

After a two-year hiatus because of Covid-19, the O'Mathalon returned this year. This event is always very popular, hugely competitive, and oftentimes rather chaotic as teams frantically solve maths problems and then run (literally) their answers up to a marker. The senior competition is a little more reserved, however, as no running is required!

Kavanagh entered teams at all levels with the team of Henry Le, Joseph Kelly, Akein Wickramagedara, and Tomas La Hood achieving a very creditable 3rd place in the Year 9 competition.

Chess

Kavanagh College had a number of students enter the Otago/Southland U20 Chess Championship in August with some great results:

- Henry Le finished the competition as the top U13 player - which was a repeat of his top placing in the Otago/Southland U13 Championship result from 2 weeks prior.
