The Olympic Experience

Kavanagh College's Head Girl, Erika Fairweather, travelled to Japan in July to compete at the Olympic Games as a member of the NZ Swimming Team. She had an amazingly successful first Olympics, including making it to the final of the 400m freestyle and setting a NZ record along the way. The whole school came together in the gym to watch her swim in the final and everyone is incredibly proud of her remarkable performances.

Here's a glimpse of the Olympic experience from Erika's perspective:

"The Olympic Games experience was by far the craziest thing I've ever done. The enormity of the event, facilities and village itself was something I wasn't prepared for. Living, eating and chatting with some of the world's most elite athletes was so eye-opening as you were surrounded by a group of people with similar goals and aspirations as yourself. Competing at the



games was a massive learning moment. Through observing I was able to see and understand how much competing at the Olympics really means to people and how easily it can change your life. Being able to wear the fern and do it justice has been a dream of mine since I was a young kid, so making that final was such a special moment for me as I am now one step closer to that dream. I would love to say I played it cool when I realised I had made an Olympic final, but that was the exact opposite of what happened! I could barely speak and getting to sleep that night was even harder. Despite the Covid restrictions and rules we had to follow, we made it happen. The Covid Olympic Games didn't let me down - instead, they opened more doors for my future in swimming." (Erika Fairweather)

Under The Door Enterprises

Throughout the year the Agribusiness class has worked hard to develop and run their own company, Under The Door Enterprises, as part of the Young Enterprise Scheme.

The team has created innovative and sustainable products made using 100% New Zealand wool to not only solve solutions to issues such as keeping doors open, jamming fingers in doors and preventing draughts from entering

the room, but also to try to support the struggling New Zealand wool industry which is facing challenging times with plastic taking over and wool prices dropping.

Under The Door Enterprises has developed a product range that includes The Woolly Wedge (a one stop door stop), The Woolly Mask (an adjustable barrier between door and frame to prevent finger and hand injuries) and The Woolly Wind Stopper (a sturdy and warm draught stopper). The local social enterprise Cargill Enterprises produces The Woolly Wedge and our team has also been working with Farmstrong to financially support the mental health of farmers as we recognise that this is an excellent cause.

Geography at Kavanagh College

Geography is a field of science devoted to the study of the lands, features, inhabitants and phenomena of the Earth and planets. At Kavanagh College we undertake some adventurous and practical fieldwork to support our learning in this subject area.

Year 13 Geography

In Level 3 Geography we take an annual trip to Queenstown to study the spatial and temporal impacts of tourism in the Lakes District. This year we enjoyed presentations from the District Council, the Queenstown Airport Corporation, the Arrowtown Museum and Destination Queenstown, all of whom were able to give us information on the environmental, economic, social and cultural impacts of both over-tourism and Covid-19. To supplement our learning we also managed to squeeze in some bungy and zipline rides, eat some Fergburger, explore the Gibbston Trail and scare ourselves at Fear Factory. We even managed a 1/2 hour trip to Kmart. The evenings were taken up with some very intense table tennis competitions, amazing Masterchef meals and general hilarity.

Year 12 Geography

Our Year 12 geographers head to the snow covered mountains of the South Island high country to go on an annual mission to view glaciers and to collect data for a Level 2 internal assessment on climate, vegetation, soil and relief. This year, once at Aoraki Mt Cook, we walked the Hooker Valley track and learnt about the history of the area, before heading to our Glentanner camp for dinner. We viewed a movie showing the Māori legends of the area at the Hermitage, then hiked up to Tasman Glacier lookout, before heading to the Red Tarns walk - an elevation of 300 metres. We collected the data we needed at four different sites, made snowpeople and engaged in some very strategic snowball throwing. We were also very lucky to take advantage of a Covid deal and experience a fixed-wing flight up to land on the Tasman Glacier. Magic!

Year 11 Geography

Year 11 geography students are tasked with the mission to find the ultimate site in Dunedin city to build a 5-star hotel. This year they went on a trip to three different car parks and assessed the rock type, the aspect, the view and the accessibility. They then mapped their findings using ARC GIS, showing the advantages and disadvantages of all sites. The future of Dunedin planning is in good hands!

Duke of Edinburgh's Hillary Gold Award

I started the Duke of Edinburgh's Hillary Award programme at the end of 2018 and I was able to work on the Silver Award as part of my Year 11 course at school. This award consists of four different tasks: physical recreation, skills, volunteering and adventurous journeys. Two of the tasks are undertaken for 26 hours and one of them requires 52 hours. For physical activity I chose karate, my volunteering was teaching junior members in karate and I continued to learn to drum for my skill. In New Zealand, it is common for the adventurous journey to involve tramping, so for my silver training tramp I went to the Oteake Conservation Park in Omarama and the Silver Peaks, while my qualifying tramp was a 3-day tramp on the Rakiura Track in Stewart Island.

I then moved on to the Gold Award at the end of 2019 and each of the tasks for this requires 52 hours of logged activity. I carried on with the same tasks, but this time my qualifying tramp needed to be 4 days and I also had to complete a residential project. This is a 5-day adventure away from home with people you've never met before and it must have a purpose. My residential project took place pre-COVID during my time in the Air Training Corps and was an event known as Exercise Cadet 2020. This was an exercise involving units of Cadet Forces nationwide and took place at the

Waiouru Military Camp where cadets engaged in exercises such as first aid, sailing, orienteering and shooting the MARS-L, the primary infantry weapon of the New Zealand Defence Force. My Gold Award training tramp was in the Hakatere Ranges through the Peel Forest Outdoor Education Centre and my qualifying tramp was the Kepler with me acting as a helper for the 2020 Kavanagh Year 10 tramping camp.

The Duke of Edinburgh's Hillary Gold Award is an internationally recognised award that acknowledges the confidence, endurance and character of the participants. I would personally recommend this award for those seeking to challenge themselves and to strengthen their character.
