The following day the entire school attended the opening Mass (celebrated by Bishop Michael and Fr Hook) at which all the prefects were presented with their badges as they take on the role of the first Trinity student leaders. Afterwards the new school flag was raised and Bishop Michael gave everyone a blessing as we now begin our journey as Trinity Catholic College.

2022 Exam Results & Academic Blues Awards

In mid-March the Academic Blues Awards evening was held at Toitū where students who achieved an Excellence endorsement in NCEA last year were recognised, as well as those who achieved 100 or more excellence credits (the Centurion Award) and those who who were successful in the scholarship exams.

At the awards evening, the students, their whānau and staff were treated to an inspiring speech by Professor Deidre Brown, who works in child psychology at the University of Otago. One of Deidre's key messages was about being adaptable and flexible when the pathway to your goal doesn't follow the direction you expected.

After three years of disruption due to Covid-19, we were pleased with our NCEA and UE results for 2022. Students and staff worked hard last year to make up for lost learning after much sickness in the first two terms. The 2022 Year 11 students performed outstandingly in NCEA with 40.7% of them gaining an excellence endorsement. Combined with merit endorsements, a huge 73% gained an endorsement. These results are far beyond those reached in the last five years with the 2018 cohort coming closest at 37.8% and 67.8% respectively.

Another highlight of the college's 2022 results was our UE pass rate of 83.5%. In the last three years, our UE results have been very pleasing and significantly higher than both decile 8-10 schools and the national average (which in 2022 were 67.6% and 50.3% respectively).

Scholarship Results

We were also very proud of our students' successes in the NZQA Scholarship examinations in 2022. Students can opt into Scholarship exams which they sit in addition to their usual NCEA exams. Scholarships are awarded nationally to just 3% of students studying each subject at Level 3. We were pleased to gain four scholarships in 2022:

- Hannah Botting Scholarship in Mathematics with Calculus and Scholarship in Chemistry
- Lily-Rose Parsons-King Scholarship in Photography
- · Dragon Winikoff Scholarship in English






Year 11 History Trip
