Our inaugural Trinity Day was a resounding success. It started with a shared staff breakfast, followed by a school Mass led by Fr Hook, with students then going on to enjoy a variety of fun activities. The day concluded with the whole school joining together and performing our haka. In keeping with our faith-based values, the day also included a call to donate basic necessities such as non-perishable food items, toiletries, and other essential supplies. These items can make a significant positive impact on individuals and families in Dunedin who are facing challenging circumstances. A great example of social justice in action. These two events raised just over \$8,000 and will support the purchase of EPro8 Electronic Technology and Construction kits along with some more equipment for students to use at break times.

Board Update

The Board would like to take this opportunity to thank Steve Read for his leadership as Acting Principal this term while Kate Nicholson has been on sabbatical. We look forward to her returning in Term 3 and sharing her learnings with all of us.

The recent school musical, *The Addams Family*, was a wonderful example of the high calibre of the performing arts in the school. There were over 100 students involved in this production and the audiences each night thoroughly enjoyed the show. A tremendous thank you to all those involved with the musical - the students on the stage and in the band, the staff who willingly gave so much of their time, the alumni who supported the band, the student tech crew, and the parent and other volunteers behind the scenes who all came together to make this an outstanding production.

Term 2 has also seen the return of winter sports and the College is well represented in multiple sporting codes across the city. Thank you to the staff, parents, and alumni who coach and manage the many teams we have.

In May, the College received its Catholic Special Character Evaluation for Development report. The purpose of this evaluation is to assess how effective the school is in managing faith and special character. This includes evaluating the efficacy of the Religious Education programme and how the whole school community engages in authentic Catholic witness and evangelisation. The evaluation noted the previous recommendations from the 2019 external review had been met. The panel members commended the Principal for her leadership in relation to the special character of the College. The report notes that the Board and the Senior Leadership Team work in unity with a high level of expertise and a strong pastoral emphasis. The result of this is a vibrant Catholic college with an evangelising influence that extends across the city's network of Catholic schools. Positive outcomes from external evaluations such as this are not achieved without significant cohesion, commitment, and support of the leadership team, together with the teaching and support staff. The Board sincerely appreciates the contribution all staff make to Trinity Catholic College.
